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Maple Valley Veterans Memorial Dedicated

Despite the gloomy weather, the spirits of over 500 community members remained high as they gathered to dedicate the Maple Valley Veterans Memorial on Veterans Day, Monday, November 11, 2024. While some work remains, the memorial is nearing completion after a decade of planning, fundraising, and construction.

Brett Habenicht, President of The Greater Maple Valley Veterans Memorial Foundation and a Navy veteran, spoke about the vision behind the project, located at the corner of Witte Road and SE 248th Street. The memorial has been designed with three key objectives, he said: to be visually striking and aesthetically pleasing, to complement and enhance the natural surroundings and nearby structures, and to stand as a dignified tribute worthy of the veterans it honors.

During the dedication, the centerpiece of the memorial—a large American flag flying proudly from a thirty-foot flagpole—was unveiled for the first time. This was

followed by the raising of a POW-MIA flag and service branch flags on twenty-five-foot poles. Soon, a walkway of inscribed and charter bricks will guide visitors into the memorial. Inside, five walls, each representing a branch of the military, will feature black granite inlays etched with the names of veterans who have lived or currently reside within the historic boundaries of the Tahoma School District. In front of each branch wall, granite benches will provide visitors with places to reflect and honor the service of these men and women. The design ensures privacy for individual visitors and

families while also offering ample space for public ceremonies and events.

The dedication ceremony provided the Memorial Foundation with an opportunity to express its gratitude to those who contributed their time, money, energy, and resources to bring the memorial to fruition. The project could not have been realized without their support. Their unyielding dedication serves as an inspiration to all and stands as a personal tribute to the military veterans of our community.

No mention of the Maple Valley

Veterans Memorial would be complete without recognizing the late United States Marine, SSqt... Storm McNeil. As Vice President of The Greater Maple Valley Veterans Memorial Foundation, SSgt. McNeil worked tirelessly from his home on Dorre Don, laying the groundwork for the memorial in its earliest stages. His fellow board members are united in their praise, that he was the driving force behind many of the project's key accomplishments, always pushing forward with his unwavering determination that

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Black Diamond Police Reports

The driver also had a warrant for their arrest. The subject was arrested. While being transported to jail the subject claimed to have swallowed drugs. The subject was released from custody so they could be evaluated at the hospital.

On 10/11/2024, Officers observed a suspicious vehicle at the 24100 block of SE 288th St. Officers ran the vehicles license plate and discovered it had a stolen status. Officers confirmed the stolen status and recovered the vehicle back to the registered owner.

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
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When Coal Was King

Franklin was developed for coal mining and operated as a company town from 1885 to 1922. Franklin's purpose was linked to 53-million-year-old coal seams discovered by Victor Tull in 1882. The town was named after Benjamin Franklin.

The Oregon Improvement Company in cooperation with the Black Diamond Coal Mining Company induced the Columbia & Puget Sound Railroad to extend tracks all the way from Renton. The railroad reached Franklin in early 1885 with the first coal shipped to Seattle in June.

Franklin's early years were dominated by labor strife and mining disasters. In 1891, African-Americans from Missouri and Illinois were given free train tickets to travel west for jobs, only to discover they were imported strike-breakers. Violence soon erupted and the National Guard was deployed following two violent deaths. Unionization efforts collapsed and some blacks left town, but many stayed working beside white miners. Three years later, on August 24, 1894, a tragic fire claimed the lives of 37 miners. It was the second-worst coal mine disaster in Washington state history.

In 1896, the Pacific Coast Company purchased the town making new investments and increasing production. Eight years later Pacific Coast acquired the Black Diamond mines. Coal mining in Franklin expanded and by the late 1890s and early 1900s coal production was averaging nearly 200,000 tons per year. Its peak population was 1,100. However, after 1908 coal output slumped and employment fell to less than 150 miners.

The Cannon Mine on the Gem seam opened around 1912 and became the town's last. It closed in 1922, not with a bang but a whimper. Several small mines attempted coal recovery in the mid-1930s but were unsuccessful. Later mining efforts were undertaken during World War II but generally failed. In 1948, Palmer Coking Coal Company obtained leases to mine Franklin's numerous coal seams by surface and underground methods.

Palmer's efforts prospered, and in 1953 the company purchased all the King County property and mineral holdings of Pacific Coast Coal Company. Palmer continued underground mining until 1971 and surface operations on Franklin Hill until 1981.

Over the nearly a century of operations, Franklin produced 4.15 million tons of coal, at a cost of 88 recorded fatalities. Daniel S. Carey, a Black Diamond resident was Franklin's last coal mine death. He was crushed in the Franklin Gem mine on November 21, 1942, when a large chunk of bony coal fell on him.

In 1973 Washington State Parks acquired most of the

In 1983, Green River Community College conducted an extensive historical and archaeological project under the direction of Gerald Hedlund and assisted by Mark Vernon. Their efforts produced a 1994 book, "From Smoke to Mist" an archeological study of Franklin, Washington.
