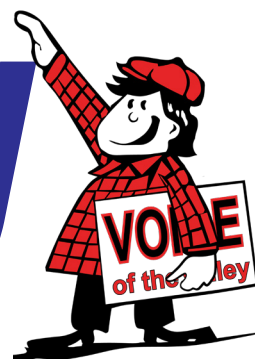

Phase 3 Development Underway at Tahoma National Cemetery

A short drive through Tahoma National Cemetery makes clear that the grounds are entering a new chapter of stewardship. Across the landscape, improvements are reshaping both the appearance and daily function of this hallowed place. The Public

Information Center and committal shelters have been re-roofed and modernized. Road curbs have been replaced, and new water spigots now line the lanes. New facilities are rising while familiar ones are being expanded and renewed. Among the additions are a dedicated Veterans Service

Organization building to support Honor Guard teams, a greatly enlarged administrative building, a new maintenance facility, and new public restrooms. Updated signage, floral stations, repaired caulking, memorial walls, and material storage stalls further reflect the care and long-term investment being devoted to the cemetery.

The most dramatic transformation is unfolding in the cemetery's northwest quadrant, where a substantial portion of the landscape has become an active construction zone. Phase 3 encompasses approximately 43 acres of largely undeveloped woodland, terrain defined by rolling topography and several small wetlands that have long bordered the cemetery's quiet edges. According to Brian Combs, Administrative Officer at Tahoma National Cemetery, the expansion includes construction of a new loop road and ten new interment sections totaling approximately 15 acres. When completed, these sections will provide 28,914 additional gravesites, including pre-placed crypt fields for traditional in-ground casket burials, a green burial area, and columbaria for above-ground interment of cremated remains.

Scheduled for completion in July 2027, the \$80 million expansion will ensure that Tahoma National Cemetery can continue serving veterans and their families for approximately 35 more years, extending its capacity through 2060. Yet the undertaking represents far more than an investment in infrastructure. It is a reaffirmation of the nation's enduring promise: that those who served—and the families entrusted with preserving their stories—will always have a place of honor in the Cascade foothills. Tour the Mansion and 1930 Japanese bathhouse, built by one of the two Japanese farming families who leased the Neely property for over 20 years.

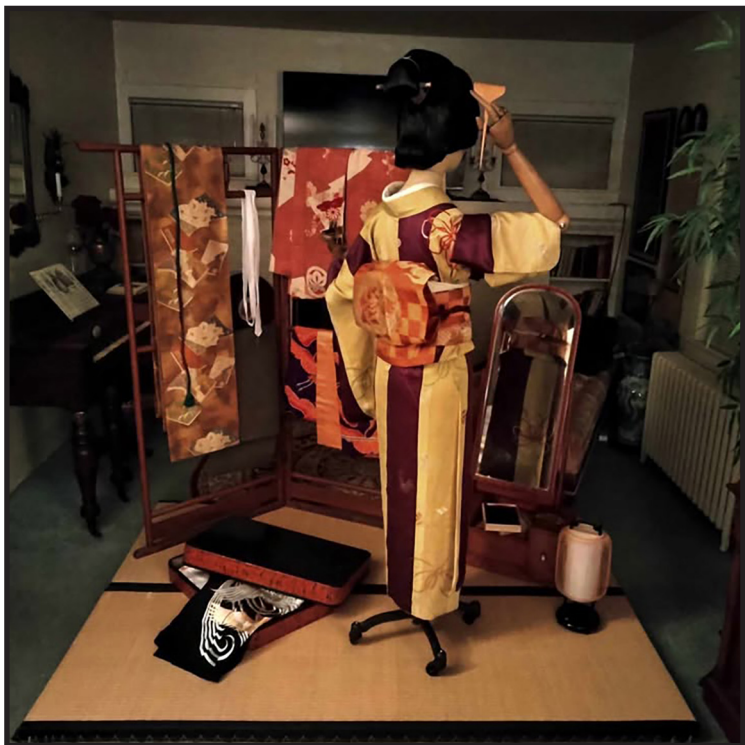

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KCCP Mid-Point Update

On Monday, July 6, the Area Council held its Regular Monthly Meeting at the Maple Valley Fire Station at 22225 SE 231st St and via Zoom. Major topics discussed were: (1) KCCP Mid-Point Update; (2) GMV/CR Subarea Plan; (3) Docket Requests; and (4) Proposed Segale Mine.

Public Comment
Robin Buxton from the Remington Home Owners' Association (HOA) and Preserve Druids Glen Committee discussed preserving the Druids Glen Golf Course and preventing it from being redeveloped into a gated community of 75+ elite houses. Druids Glen has many ecosystem benefits it provides to the region and a major housing development will impact or destroy much of it if approved by King County. The HOA and Committee have been reaching out to King County throughout the year and demanding strict zoning and environmental compliance as it review the Land Development Permit Application submitted by Parks Legacy, current owner based in Arizona. KCCP Mid-Point Update
Erin Auzins, Regional Planning Lead in the King County (KC) Executive's Office, discussed the 2029 King County Comprehensive Plan (KCCP) 5-year Midpoint Update (2029 Midpoint Update)—an opportunity to make substantive policy changes that address long-term needs and advance the County's policy goals. A *Scope of Work* is being developed that will guide the development of the 2029 Midpoint Update, inform the environmental review and public participation plans, and be the basis for an equity-impact analysis of the proposed update, see: 2029 KCCP 5 Yr Mid-Point Update Scope of Work presentation.

The proposed *Scope of Work* to be released on July 13, for Public Comment, is organized according to three Focus Areas: Climate Change and Resiliency; Shorelines; and Housing—as well as other general changes. Within each there are possible topics that might be included in the 2029 Midpoint Update, pending additional analysis. Unlike the KCCP 10-year Major Updates, additional topics and/or issues not included in the *Scope of Work* may not be considered as part of the 2029 Midpoint Update, unless they are allowed during a KCCP Annual Update.

The Public can submit Comments on the proposed *Scope of Work* by August 2 by email to CompPlan@kingcounty.gov. Opportunities for providing comments, as well as other information about the Comprehensive Plan, can be found at www.kingcounty.gov/CompPlan. Public input will be used to help refine and finalize the KC Executive's *Scope of Work*, which is anticipated to be submitted to the KC Council in November 2026 and adopted by the Council, after its review and amendment, in February 2027. Each of these events afford additional opportunities to submit Public Comment.

The Area Council's four major subject-matter committees will conduct reviews of the *Scope of Work* and prepare detailed comments to be submitted by the above deadline.

GMV/CR Subarea Plan
Susan McLain, KC Subarea Planning Manager, discussed the status of The Greater Maple Valley/Cedar River (GMV/CR) Community Service Area (CSA) Subarea Plan—a long-range community vision over the next 20 years. On May 18 the Area Council submitted its details Comments on the *Preliminary Plan*. Ms. McLain stated those comments were extremely helpful as they continue their review.

At tonight's meeting Ms. McLain discussed a handful of draft land-use and zoning map amendments within the Subarea:

- Split-zone or split-land use: Properties with more than one zone classification or land use designation
- Update P-Suffix conditions and overlays when: (10 Countywide code supersedes or does a better job (repeal); (2) The condition has been met (repeal); or Update for current terms'
- Evaluate "potential" zoning
- Inconsistent zone classifications and land use
- Evaluate Rural Neighborhood Commercial Center-designated properties where zoning and land use are inconsistent

Ms. McLain agreed to continue conversations with the Area Council, as its Preliminary Plan Comments are reviewed. The Area council also has provided Ms. McLain with a list of key subject-matter experts who would like to speak with her Interdepartmental Team regarding the Area Council's detailed Comments in those areas.

Docket Requests
The Joint Team of four Urban and ten Rural Unincorporated Area organizations, coordinated by the Area Council, submitted four Docket Request to KC by the end of 2025:

1. Amend Rural Neighborhood Commercial Center (RNCC) policy / code to allow only businesses (the express purpose of RNCCs) and prohibit housing, which would displace businesses (see: gmvuac.org/wp/wp-content/uploads/2025/02/KCCP-Docket-Request-RNCCs-2-14-25.pdf).

2. Amend Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) code to adequately address environmental, health, and safety (see: gmvuac.org/wp/wp-content/uploads/2026/06/KCCP-Docket-Request-BESS.pdf). Due to a tight deadline at the end of the year, this was prepared and submitted by individuals who represented a *subset* of Joint Team members.

3. Amend, in the Rural Area, Agriculture and Forestry Product Processing policy / code to require materials be grown in KC (see: gmvuac.org/wp/wp-content/uploads/2025/12/D.I.-Request-Local-Ag-Forest-Product-Processing.pdf).

4. Amend Mineral Operations 5-yr Periodic Review policy / code to include the Mining Reclamation (see: gmvuac.org/wp/wp-content/uploads/2025/12/Docket-Request-Mining-Operation-Periodic-Reviews.pdf).

On April 30 KC published its 2026 Docket Report (<https://cdn.kingcounty.gov/-/media/king-county/depts/local-services/permits/regional-planning/comprehensive-plan/dockets/2026-docket-report.pdf?rev=583357741c3b432f8c6a7b8e8786c786&hash=3724E8431764F6FF37BAD0BADE24E5CB>), which detailed its decisions on each Docket Request received in 2025 from the Public. Each of the above-listed Docket Requests were rejected for a variety of reasons.

Several Joint Team members met with Erin Auzins earlier in the day to discuss each request and KC's assessment of same. The Joint Team has asked to speak with members of KC's Interdepartmental Team. Erin stated she would follow up on that.

Proposed Segale Mine
The Segale Development Corporation proposes a mine and an asphalt plant on ~1,000 ac in a low area across the Green River from Kanasket-Palmer State Park (K-PSP) at the top of the Green River Gorge (near to Cumberland). The Park anchors the top of the Gorge, similar to how Flaming Geyser State Park anchors the downstream end of the Gorge.

There has been a back-and-forth between Segale and King County on several issues: (1) A proposed swap of WA-Department of Natural Resources (DNR) land to move the mine (note there is one mine with five different pits planned); (2) What would be included in Environmental Impact Statement (EIS); (3) Outright purchase of the Segale property; and (4) Other matters.

On Wednesday, July 8, the King County Department of Local Services—Permitting Division (DLS/P) will issue a Determination of Significance (DS) (<https://kingcounty.gov/en/dept/local-services/buildings-property/public-notices-permit-records-search/special-interest-projects>), which will trigger the need for an EIS to be prepared. There will be a 30-day Public Comment period through Friday, August 7.

The project, as proposed, would have major impacts on K-PSP, including the only public campground along the entire Green-Duwamish River, as well as impacts to water quality, fish and terrestrial species, human health, and traffic throughout SE King County.

The Area Council voted to work with and support other SE King County organizations to prepare a set of Public Comments on the DS.

Next Area Council Meeting
The next Area Council monthly meeting will be held **Monday, August 3, 2026**, from **7 - 9:30 PM** at the Maple Valley Fire Station at 22225 SE 231st St (across from the KC Sheriff's Precinct).

Meetings are held on the *first* Monday of the month (except for Holidays, when they are held on the *second* Monday). All meeting announcements, agendas, and Zoom information are posted on the Area Council's Website (www.gmvuac.org) and local *NextDoor* platforms. You can also find us on our FaceBook page (<https://www.facebook.com/GMVUAC/>). Each meeting begins with an open Public Comment period where anyone can voice concerns, comments, etc.

When Coal Was King

One hundred years ago, the Black Diamond junior high student body, likely consisting of 7th and 8th grades, assembled in front of the town's first proper school building, constructed in the early 1900s. The school district was established on November 6, 1885, just three years after coal was discovered there and the Black Diamond Coal Mining Company of Nortonville, California, moved operations 800 miles north from their Bay Area founding.

In the very early years, school classes were held in family homes, the Masonic Hall, and the Congregational Church. As production expanded, Black Diamond's population grew, and this first wooden school was constructed in the early 1900s. As nearby coal-mining towns such as Franklin and Kummer closed down in the 1910s, their districts were absorbed into Black Diamond, necessitating the construction of a new brick high school in 1921, located 50 feet southeast of this structure.

During the early 1920s, coal mine production endured a long, slow decline. As employment prospects faded, families moved away, and Black Diamond's school enrollment shrank. In 1943, Black Diamond was forced to consolidate, sending its high school students to Enumclaw. That change resulted in this wooden school being demolished shortly thereafter, with the brick high school building serving grades one through eight thereafter. That brick school was torn down in 1963 and replaced by an elementary school on the same site.

In 1975, Black Diamond was fully absorbed into the Enumclaw School District. The 1963 elementary school was torn down in 2017 and replaced by the current Black Diamond Elementary, serving kindergarten through 5th grade.

In 1999, the Black Diamond Urban Growth Area Agreement was signed, paving the way for population growth. Oakpointe's Ten Trails and Lawson Master Planned Developments were approved in 2010. Oakpointe broke ground on Ten Trails in 2016, with the first home sales occurring in late 2017.

Today, through annexations and expansions, the City of Black

Diamond is home to four different school districts: Auburn, Enumclaw, Kent, and Tahoma. However, the vast majority of future growth will occur in the Enumclaw School District, which recently approved construction of a new school, Evergreen Elementary, to be located in Ten Trails.

Back in 1926, Black Diamond had 68 high school students spanning grades 9 through 12, with another 42 junior high students in grades 7 and 8. Fortunately, an unknown student wrote the names of those junior high students plus one teacher in cursive on the back of the picture. While the penmanship was clear, some letters were difficult to decipher, and some names were spelled wrong. It was also apparent that the two columns of names on the back generally corresponded with row numbers we've inserted to aid in identifying individual students, though there may be some mistakes. Name and spelling corrections are encouraged and welcome.
